

The Missionary Charism of FMA in Northeast India with special reference to Shillong Province

Continuation

Community Development Programme

Community development programme is another venture taken by the FMAs. In connection to this, a registered body of the province was constituted which is called as FMA Outreach for Underprivileged Women and Children (OUWC) bearing registration No. E.16 (RS) 30/2001/446 under Meghalaya Societies Registration. It is a private non-government and non-political organization of the Salesian Sisters of Northern India, which though affiliated to the International Non-governmental developmental organization promoted by the Institute of the Salesian Sisters of Don Bosco Rome, is an autonomous organization with its own statutes and regulations, legally constituted and works on an international level of co-operation for development.

The activities carried out under the banner of FMA-Outreach for Underprivileged Women and Children comprises of Vocational Training and community development activities. FMA Outreach offers various courses to prepare personnel in order to reach out to the rural areas and implement various developmental programmes in different fields. They also conduct programmes for the recipients themselves to empower and equip them with skills and confidence and make them self-sustainable. The Sisters also make effort to bring about change in the society through the agent of small catalyst - Children's Parliament. This is a pretty new venture of the province, which we hope would flourish and imbibe in young minds the urgency of having strong governance in order to curb corruption and bring about development and prosperity to the society at large.

Vocational Training Centres: The Vocational Training Centres (VTCs) run by the Sisters are spread in the nine centres namely FMA Outreach Lumshyiap – Shillong, Garobadha, Mawtnum, Mawkyndeng, Nongstoin, Nongthymmai, Rambrai, Rangblang and Tura. Some of the VTCs are registered under the District Commerce and Industries Centre (DCIC) Office in their respective districts. The various courses offered are tailoring, stitching, embroidery, weaving and knitting. These courses prepare and empower them to be self-sufficient and raise the standard of living and certificates are given at the end of the course through DCIC. A stipend is also given through the centres to legible candidates every year. Some of the trainees who have passed out from these centres are now running their own tailoring school; some have in turn become instructors in the VTC itself and have been able to generate income for the livelihood of their respective families. Besides the above-mentioned skills, Short Term Computer Courses are being offered in the centres of Mawtnum, Nongstoin, Tura, Bellefonte Community College and FMA Outreach, Shillong.


Prison ministry: We began our Apostolate in the juvenile home from the year 2003 under the leadership of Sr. Magdalene Synnah and the past pupils. At present the juvenile home

is in Cleve Colony Shillong. It is a place where the boys were kept for on observation, accommodating around 40-50 boys. The Sisters visit them every Sunday and interacts with them, plays and teaches them games, conducts competitions. In a way they offer them counseling and also caters to their spiritual needs even by making the sacraments available to them by calling a priest. During Christmas and Easter we do share our joy with them through a sumptuous meal prepared from our convent.

Short Stay Home: Short Stay Home centre at Mawtnum started in 2011 for the purpose of preventing women and children from exploitation and to provide temporary accommodation to women and girls who are at risk.

Creche: The centre at Mawtnum and Mawkyndeng also run Crèche. The number of children registered in the crèche since 2010 at Mawtnum centre is 380.

Job placement: Sisters at Mawtnum community identify young girls and arrange and sponsors for their training in various skills and help them find job. The various courses for which the service is made are: General Nurse Mid-wivery (GNM), Auxiliary Nurse Mid-wivery (ANM), Diploma in Lab Technician (DMLT), Pharmacy training and Home guard. For the nurses sponsors are being done through the nurses'



rolling fund where once they start earning they repay it gradually without any interest.

Oratories: Right from the start the Sisters run Oratories on Sundays in different places where the young and children are gathered and given an ambient joy and fun through games and group interactions and usually with catechism classes and a moment. At Bellefonte, Shillong Sisters run a daily oratory wherein the children come there for free tuition, to experience the atmosphere of Salesianity and prayer the whole of the afternoon time and go back home in the evening after a meal.

Youth Ministry: In the real essence all our work and apostolate is geared towards the development and empowerment of the young people. Aware of the fact that youth is the essence of existence as Salesians the Sisters are involved in various ways in working among the youth. Besides the work they do through institutions occasionally events are created where the young gather for youth camps where values are taught to them. Salesian Sisters of India have started Auxilium Youth movement where young people of ages 14 above can be enrolled. It is a movement under which various clubs are functioning. It is an occasion to bring the youth together and help them develop their potentials and a way of preparing them to be a good and honest citizen. The Sisters also collaborate with the Diocese and other religious congregations

in their youth ministry. In the past some Sisters had worked in DBYES as the lady animator and conducted various programmes in collaboration with the others.

Media Education: Media and technology is the lifeline of the young today. Feeling the pulse of these wavelengths of the young with whom we work and attuned to the influence of media in the life of

the young people, a Media syllabus is introduced in our schools with prepared textbook for the students and the teachers by the FMA INDIA Social Communication team. Besides that we have introduced media clubs in the schools where various programmes on media awareness and prudent use of it is sensitized in the young. Media coordinator of the Province goes around different schools and our centres conducting programmes on media awareness and also disseminates useful information regularly on media tips through FMA INSinfo, the newsletter of the province.

Mission Ad gentes:

The formation of the missionaries was one of the areas of attention of the Institute as it launched its mission into more and more lands in the different parts of the world. Our Province has grown up to this stage because of our missionaries. Harkening to the call of our Mother General the Province sends Sisters to the Mission and the status as of today who have gone to the Missions are :

In & Around Our Province

37th Annual Provincial Congress of the Salesian Cooperators

The 37th Annual Provincial Congress cum Bicentenary Celebration of the Association of Salesian Cooperators Shillong Province commenced on 5th September 2015 at Divine Saviour Parish Hall, Nongthymmai. The Nongthymmai Centre hosted the annual event of the association. The participants numbering 255 have come from the 16 centres of the Province.

At the outset the participants gathered outside the hall for

the flag hoisting ceremony in which Fr. Festus Shadap SDB, former Salesian Delegate for Salesian Family, Silchar Province was the Chief Guest. The Pre-Aspirants of Auxilium Nongthymmai with their welcome song and choreography and the Novices from Bellefonte with their prayer dance made the inaugural function very meaningful and solemn. The lighting of the lamp invoked God's presence and enlightenment as they embarked on the two days of sharing and celebration.

Fr. Edmund Gomes SDB, Parish Priest of Divine Saviour Parish, Nongthymmai exhorted the Cooperators to be a leaven in the world and to give Gospel witness to the society in which they live. On this auspicious occasion, the following day 6 September saw nine new members to the Association through the promise-taking at Divine Saviour Parish Church, Nongthymmai – Shillong. The solemn and meaningful act took place at the celebration of the Holy Eucharist presided over by Fr. Paul Lyngkot, Salesian Vice Provincial of Silchar Province.

The Flag bearer Mr. Marius Kharkongor, Local Delegate of Nongthymmai Centre, and Mr. Anthony Laloo, Provincial Coordinator led the new members to the altar accompanied by the Celebrants. The symbolic gesture of the lighted candle held in their hands signifies the joy of living and sharing the Salesian Spirit in their different life's situation. At the homily, Fr. Paul exhorted the Salesian Cooperators to live the Spirit of Don Bosco in the world. He also



reminded the gathering on the words of Pope Francis which have been resonated to the Salesian Family by the Rector Major Don Angel Fernandez Artime on being cheerful despite the monotony and struggles of life. The assembly witnessed the readiness of the new members to live the spirit of Don Bosco through the pronouncement of the formula of the promise. After the promise taking the certificates were signed on the altar and were distributed to all the newly promised members.

The Association of Salesian Cooperators Shillong Province was started in 1977 with



Auxilium Nongthymmai as its office. It was through Sr. Catherine Susngi that the association was initiated in the province. Presently there are sixteen centres, one sub-centre and three aspiring centres. Out of which eleven of them are directly under the care of the FMAs.

Workshop on FMA India Child Protection Policy held in Shillong

A two-day workshop was conducted for the Animators, School Sisters and members of the Provincial Team on Understanding, Implementing and Institutionalizing of FMA India Child Protection Policy. It was held from 5-6 October 2015 at Auxilium Provincial House. The resource persons were Fr. Joe Xavier SJ Executive Director, Indian Social Institute, Delhi and Sr. Isabella Alphonse FMA from Chennai Province who is also the National Development Forum Coordinator. 52 participants took part in it.

The significant event commenced with a prayerful moment based on the Gospel of St. Matthew 19:14, "Let the little children come to me". Immediately after the prayer moments, Sr. Isabella Suja the Provincial gave a welcome address to the resource persons and all the participants.

The first day was divided into four sessions. Sr. Isabella Alphonse took the first session: context, Processes and Final Document of FMA-CPP during which she presented the journey towards the FMA-INDIA Child Protection Policy. Various important points such as global context, abuses and consequences, stages in the creation of CPP, its application and advantages were dealt with. Sr. Isabella has enriched the sisters not just with her presentation but her experiences and competence.

Fr. Joe Xavier who gave an explanation on the document-FMA Child Protection Policy took the second session. The entire session was a complete overview of the same. The structure of the document was presented and discussed in brief. Each topic was then explained briefly and among those, the role and functions of the designated officers were delved



in detail. Fr. Joe made sure that every participant got a clear understanding of the document making it a very interactive and interesting session. Many questions were put before him and his response was prompt and to the point.

During the afternoon session Fr. Joe Xavier broke the participants into four groups after a brief instruction on the group activity. The groups then dispersed to discuss and prepare mock cases and presented the same in the evening. After every presentation a detailed evaluation was done whereupon various queries were answered to and doubts clarified.

The second day saw the sharing of two of our Sisters Sr. Happyline Shadap a member of CWC (Child Welfare Committee) in Ri Bhoi District and Sr. Cecilia Ksoo

a member of the JJB (Juvenile Justice Board) West Khasi Hills District of Meghalaya. The groups then engaged themselves in the planning matrix for the province. A compilation group was also set up who compiled all the reports of the group and presented the consolidated work.

The programme concluded with a solemn valedictory function in which Sr. Isabella Suja the Provincial gave the concluding message. The Social Development Coordinator of the Province Sr. Gemima Pohrmen invited every one to rise up in which a prayer for Victims of Child Abuse was prayed together and followed by the Institute Anthem. Thus, the workshop that began with a prayer ended well with a prayer.

Just to break the monotony the Nurses had a lunch out wherein they continued their discussion and feedback of the whole event. During the Goodnight, Sr. Marcellina Sangma encouraged us to go back with greater zeal to make our VTCs more vibrant and innovative without allowing the waves of difficulties to pull down our enthusiasm. Along with them there was also a girl who is now grown and was present for the function. Sr. Jomita apologized to the faithful for not putting visit programmes to the village of Monabari 'A' those years after the incident because of the trauma she went through.

This memorial is the initiative of St. Dominic's Parish, Garobadha in appreciation of the missionary zeal of Sr. Rital who spent most years of her religious life in the Garo Hills and finally gave up her life while on her mission. She along with Sr. Jomita and another girl were crossing a river on a raft on 15 September 2007, wherein the raft gave way. The Sisters were very conscious to protect the life of the girl and in that situation Sr. Rital succumb to the river and gave up her spirit. We salute this courageous Sister whom the Lord found ready at her work place.



Living the Don Bosco Legend

We are almost at the end of 2015 and it has been a year that was marked with innumerable celebrations in honour of a great Champion of Youth, a Perpetually Youthful Saint - Don Bosco - a legend that is still alive today!

Celebrating the bicentenary of the birth of Don Bosco was an unforgettable experience, a grace-filled opportunity for all his sons and daughters and for the world of young people. Participating in the spellbound, magnificent celebrations organized at local, regional, national and international level, exhibiting the love and affection we bear for him, we realize how much we are called to live his spirit and charism and make him alive for the world of young people, who are in need of fathers and mothers, brothers and sisters, educators and guides, friends and companions just like Don Bosco was for them.

Don Bosco - some thought he was a saint, some others thought he was mad, some thought he spent too much time with urchins and street children, unwanted and despised, while others thought he was the friend of the Popes, Kings and the affluent. While some plotted against him, many believed in him, admired him



and followed him. But such had been the lot of the Divine Master whose faithful disciple he was. In spite of this, he persevered; he maintained his equanimity, peace and cheerful attitude. He retained extraordinary trust and confidence in young people and believed that, however degraded their condition or behaviour, tapping into their innate goodness, we can raise them for better heights, higher goals, nobler visions and greater achievements. He was courageous and daring to risk anything and everything for the sake of his young people whom he loved dearly, passionately and unconditionally. He never lost his trust and confidence in them and in what they could be under the influence of divine grace. This trust enabled him to nurture them, educate them, form them and transform them into 'Young Saints - Heroes of Holiness' in his Oratories, Youth Centres, Schools - in a word, in all his educational setting.

Don Bosco - Two magic words that have been the inspiration for thousands of his sons and daughters to make inroads into the lives of young people to Engage, Educate and Empower and shape their lives and destinies in a meaningful way during these past 200 years. Don Bosco was a man of God and a man for others, deeply human, deeply holy. He was a man for all times and for all

seasons. He was a great Educator, a prolific writer and publisher, tireless worker, undaunted visionary, a holy priest, master of youthful holiness – all for his young people. Rarely the world has produced a person who loved the young people so very much like Don Bosco.

Don Bosco is a saint, one of the greatest stars that shines brightly in the Church. Mighty works have been done through him: numerous souls received God's forgiveness and enlightenment from him; bodies and souls were healed by his prayer and blessing. He read in the hearts of people as in a book and gave direction to souls in private conversations and in public talks. In his dreams and communication with God he saw hidden things. It was clear that he lived intensely in the presence of God and had God's holy will always at heart. He was truly a man of God.

But while he was profoundly immersed in God, and perhaps on account of this, he, as his divine model, Jesus, remained intensely human. Don Bosco was everywhere and above all the priest, the man of God. Everything he said and did ultimately had the purpose of God's glory and the salvation of souls. He was not content to provide for the needs of the soul in isolation from the needs of the body. In a sense we can say that he was a subscriber to the modern theory which says that human beings cannot think of God with an empty stomach. He lived the joys and sorrows

of the people of his times, of his young people, of the society, of the Church. He did not run away from this world but, as the divine presence in penetrating all human activity so Don Bosco remained immersed in the life of the world. He was only intent on saving it and making it better. Don Bosco was able to take such an active part in the history of his period and at the same time remain so united with God.

Don Bosco is both a saint of the past, a saint relevant for today and for all times. For his radical union with Christ, who is the same 'yesterday, today and always', Don Bosco is a saint for all times. The fact that Don Bosco still attracts crowds of youth, that shows that he possesses something that transcends the centuries. Those who live in his family or those who like to be with him can receive without any fear the message of sanctity – simple and profound, compelling and beautiful, happy and cheerful. Don Bosco, who was kind and understanding wants that 'we be not worldly in the world; not strangers but people with a specific identity; not out of date but prophets of the eschatological reality of the resurrection; not easy followers of novelty but courageous agents of a taxing renewal; not escapists from human vicissitudes but leaders of the history of salvation. Our following of Christ according to the spirit of Don Bosco makes use of all occasions, events and signs of the times, even the most adverse and unjust situations to grow and make others grow in sanctity' (Don Egidio Viganò). The greatest gift we can give to others is our sanctity.

As we solemnly conclude the Bicentenary celebrations, a Jubilee Year of the Salesian Family, the birth of this great and remarkable saint of the young people, we hear a clarion call to start afresh from Don Bosco, 'the man of dreams.' Don Bosco lived his dream – the dream of changing young people's lives from wolves into lambs, from seclusion to inclusion, from meaninglessness to significance, from worthlessness to importance. He worked day and night to make his dream come true, bringing hope to the young who had lost hope, healing the young who were broken hearted, joy and happiness to those who were sad and depressed. He worked with singleness of purpose to see them in a better situation than when he first met them. His dedication to the young remains the mark of his sanctity.

These young people are with us too. It is our mission to bring Don Bosco to the youth of today. It is our responsibility to touch young people's hearts with hope, joy and fulfillment, and like Don Bosco always "with the young, for the young." It is a call to work like Don Bosco, love like Don Bosco and venture into the lives of young people like Don Bosco, with courage, competence, conviction and creativity.

A traveler after walking some distance met Don Bosco advancing from the opposite direction, and asked him, "Fr. Could you please tell me the distance and how much time do I need to reach that village up there?"

Theme announced for 2016 World Communications Day Message

(Vatican Radio) The Pontifical Council for Social Communications announced the theme for the 2016 World Communications Day. It is Communication and Mercy: A Fruitful Encounter.

The day is celebrated each year on the Sunday before Pentecost, which next year is on 8 May. World Communications Day was established by Paul VI after the Second Vatican Council in order to draw attention to the “the vast and complex phenomenon of the modern means of social communication.”

This year’s theme was decided in order to coincide with the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy, the Holy Year called by Pope Francis to announce the Mercy of God.



Communication and Mercy: a fruitful encounter

The choice of theme this year has clearly been determined by the Celebration of the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy, and the Holy Father undoubtedly

desired that World Communications Day would provide the appropriate occasion to reflect on the deep synergy between communication and mercy.

In the Bull of Indiction of the Jubilee Year, in paragraph 12, the Pope affirms that: The Church is commissioned to announce the mercy of God, the beating heart of the Gospel, which in its own way must penetrate the heart and mind of every person. He adds: Her language and her gestures must transmit mercy, so as to touch the hearts of all people and inspire them once more to find the road that leads to the Father. It is helpful, in this regard, to remember that our reflection is situated in the context of an awareness that communication is a key element for the promotion of a culture of encounter.

The Pope, on this occasion, refers to the language and gestures of the Church but the context makes it clear that all men and women in their own communications, in their reaching out to meet others, ought to be motivated by a deep expression of welcome, availability and forgiveness.

The Theme highlights the capacity of good communication to open up a space for dialogue, mutual understanding and reconciliation, thereby allowing

fruitful human encounters to flourish. At a time when our attention is often drawn to the polarized and judgmental nature of much commentary on the social networks, the theme invokes the power of words and gestures to overcome misunderstandings, to heal memories and to build peace and harmony.

Once again, Pope Francis is reminding us that, in its essence, communication is a profoundly

human achievement. Good communication is never merely the product of the latest or most developed technology, but is realized within the context of a deep interpersonal relationship. World Communications Day, the only worldwide celebration called for by the Second Vatican Council (“Inter Mirifica”, 1963), is marked in most countries, on the recommendation of the bishops of the world, on the Sunday before Pentecost (in 2016, May 8th).

The Holy Father’s message for World Communications Day is traditionally published in conjunction with the Memorial of St. Francis de Sales, patron of writers (January 24).





to the world and to the Church herself, this silent witness of poverty and abnegation, of purity and sincerity, of self-sacrifice in obedience, can become an eloquent witness capable of touching also non-Christians who have good will and are sensitive to certain values, "Doing the work to completion is my food (Jn 4:34) it is not to do my own will that I have come down from heaven, but to do the will of Him who sent me" Jn 6 : 38.


