A Synod on the Young

n 13 January 2017, Pope Francis himself, in a letter addressed to the young, announced the Synod that will be celebrated in October 2018 on the theme: "The Young, Faith, and Vocational Discernment".

"Depart from your land and go to a land that I will show you" (*Gen* 12:1). The Pope tells the young, "These are the words of a Father who today invites us to go out to launch ourselves toward an unknown future but that is the bearer of secure realizations that He Himself will accompany you to meet".

Go out, leave one reality to go toward a new land, toward a more just and fraternal society according to the desires that the young themselves nourish in their heart.

However, for those who have faith in Jesus, the verb *to go out* has another meaning. It means to leave everything **to follow the Teacher there, where He leads us**. Responding to the question in every person's heart – "Where do you live?" – He invites us to enter into His house: ssign"Come and See".

This invitation is also addressed to the young today to whom Jesus turns His gaze full of goodness and love (cf. *Letter* 13/01/2017).

It is the task of the Church community to help the young to feel embraced by this gaze, provoked by the voice of Jesus, moved by the impulse to begin walking, not alone, but with the help of expert guides, able to accompany, guide, support, contagion, witness.

The **goal of the journey** is the joyful encounter with the God of life, with Jesus, who took on our fragility and suffering, our joys and our hopes, and brings our dreams of happiness to fulfillment (cf. *ibid*).

The Document in preparation for the Synod emphasizes the need to listen to the young. They present common characteristics on all five continents, along with many different aspects. What unites them is a context of "fluidity and uncertainty never before experienced" where few are privileged and many live in situations of vulnerability and insecurity. All of this has a major impact on their life choices.

Certainly, not all of the considerations of the Document are applicable to the contexts of the various Countries, this is why it is necessary to listen directly to the young, as the Document recommends.

In general, the Christian youth of India desire a Church that is closer to the people, more attentive to social problems, more authentic and coherent. They live in a context that is not against Christianity, but that has millennial religious traditions that must be respected. India is the cradle of religions such as: Hinduism,

Buddhism, Jainism, and Sikhism, which are flanked by the Abrahamic religions. The traditional religions preach non-violence, tolerance, peace, harmony, reconciliation, even though there are fanatical groups in some areas that make co-existence more difficult.

The young live in a reality that is continually more 'hyper-connected' which tends to structure even their way of thinking, their concept of the world, and even interpersonal relationships.

They experience the provisory nature of every choice: "Today I choose this. Tomorrow, I will see." This makes a definitive choice of life more and more difficult. They are afraid of a 'yes forever'.

Vocational discernment in this context, is accompanied by a great capacity for closeness, orientation, witness. The preparatory Document explains discernment in these actions: "Recognize, interpret, choose".

Personal accompaniment must reach "favoring the relationship between the

person and the Lord, collaborating to remove what impedes it".

The art of accompaniment is then summarized in these three verbs: "go out, see, call".

"Go out" means abandoning the "schemes" that pigeon hole people and make the joy of the Gospel less credible. It also means abandoning an anachronistic language; to see is "to be" with young people to "listen to their stories"; "calling" is awakening desire, moving people from what keeps them blocked, asking questions without pretending to offer ready-made answers.

An important emphasis in the Document is that "the whole Christian community must feel responsible for the task of educating the new generations". We need "adults worthy of faith, authoritative believers, with a clear human identity, a solid ecclesial belonging". The educational role played by families and other educational agencies is "irreplaceable".

My Experience in the field of Evangelization

Il through my religious life as a temporary professed Sister I was working in the school but there is something within me that urges me to go and proclaim. Obviously those experiences of being in the Sunday Oratory and visiting villages during holidays have inspired me to dedicate my life for evangelization. Therefore after my perpetual profession in 1991, I asked Mother Philomena Prabalanathan, the

then Provincial to allow me to go for direct evangelization. Again I was sent to a school, in Little Flower Imphal; here I took to heart visiting the families of non-Christians, as we know the Catholic population was very insignificant at that time. On every Sunday, along with a teacher I visited the Sangaiprou village, which takes half an hour or so walk from the Convent and was inhabited by the Rongmei tribe of Manipur. Gradually, with continuous



follow up in making known to them about Jesus and the Catholic faith they embraced the faith and received Baptism. In this way I found such joy in sharing my faith with others, which in turn strengthens my own. After the bifurcation of the Guwahati from Shillong Province I got a chance of being in the direct evangelization in Rangblang Parish for six years, in Nongstoiñ for two years and in Mawkyndeng for four years. During these twelve years of my experience in the field of direct evangelization I found that collaboration with others in order to reach to more people is an effective way of evangelization. Mingling with the Catholic Women's Association (Seng Longkmie), Salesian Cooperators, the Youth groups and teachers of the villages have helped me in the apostolate of teaching Catechism, family visits and organizing various activities. It is also one of the means where the laity is empowered and is able to dedicate their time and energy for Church activities making them as shared partners in the work of evangelization. Sharing the real life of the people; staying with them in their homes, going to their fields and meeting them at their work place have at times edified me in the way they take the events of life in faith and most of all their simplicity of life and joy of living gives me courage to sow the seed of the Word of God in them.

Some of the activities that we usually carry out are systematic family visits

especially the sick and lapse Catholics, conducting Seminars, Retreats, Sunday Class, Oratory, and preparation for the various Sacraments namely Baptism, Confirmation, First Holy Communion, Confession and Matrimony. I had the fortune of attending many Training Programs on Small Christian Communities in which I have come to understand better its goals. In whichever village I visited I encourage the faithful to form SCC groups wherein the new way of being Church by using the seven steps of reading the Word of God is encouraged. It also emphasized on to know, to love and to live the Word of God. At present in my mission at Mawkyndeng I am given the responsibility of being the Chairperson of the Catechetical Committee. Hence various Competitions involving the villages in the Parish like Quiz on Catechism, Preaching, Singing from the Catholic Hymn Book (Ka Lynti Bneng) and Bible Skits. Another field of my interest is to promote vocations to the Association of the Salesian Cooperators. My special joy is that within these four years I have been able to guide and encourage forty-eight members who have taken their promise as full-fledged Salesian Cooperators. Another milestone in my mission was the great joy of being able to initiate eight Oratory centers at Mawkyndeng and other big villages of the Parish in collaboration with the Salesian Cooperators on 16 August 2014 marking the inauguration of the bi-centenary birth of Don Bosco. Hence from then on, once a year on 31 of January in honour of Don Bosco an Oratory Day is organized for the three Parishes of Mawkyndeng, Barato and Sahsniang run by the Salesian Cooperators.

There have been varied experiences in these years but I would like to narrate just two very significant ones. In 2014 several times I have attempted to visit a family of Nida-emki Biam a new convert from Raliang village who was preparing for the Sacrament of Matrimony at that time but since her family belongs to the traditional religion I was not able to do so. The family was so staunch that no religious could enter the family. The girl on her marriage day was not allowed to come home and so all the needful was done in her God mother's house and she went to the Church for the Sacrament of matrimony and to tie the knot with Mr. Edmon Phawa from Mawpasi. The marriage scene turned into a tearful gathering on witnessing this marriage unprecedented in the Khasi culture that a girl has to go to the boy's house on the day of her wedding. It was beautiful on the other hand to see the faithful of Raliang village who contributed to making the day a memorable one by

giving a tea party to all present and most importantly shouldered the responsibility of being family to her by taking care of all the necessities for the smooth running of the celebration. In another incident, which happened at Mooshrot village, there was a certain family who lost their child but was not happy with the way they were treated for the funeral of the same by the Presbyterian Church where they belonged. No prayer service was conducted; the child was just buried without any formal rites, which saddened the family to the core. This was due to their poverty they could not give the church contribution. Unhappy with all that happened they associated themselves to the Catholic faithful where I had the joy of instructing them to the faith and it was a joyful event on 24 December 2015 that the whole family became Catholic. Another striking thing that happened was that they managed to obtain permission from the Headman to exhume the body of the child from the Presbyterian cemetery and brought it to the Catholic cemetery.

Having shared so much, not all is smooth sailing but I do encounter some problems in making known Jesus and the Gospel values. These are accepted in the light of faith and always striving

Well of Valponasca in Memory of the Jowai Pioneers

befitting conclusion of the 140 years of the First Missionary Expedition of the Institute was marked on 7 December 2017 with the blessing and inauguration of the Well of Valponasca at St. Mary Mazzarello Convent Jowai. The well is dedicated to the Pioneers of Jowai community namely Sr. Innocenza Vallino, Sr. Clotilde Appiano and Sr. Cecilia Da Roit also a Pioneer in the Northeast India. The seed that they have sown and the sweat that they have toiled has made Jowai to what it is now, embracing many young people of the region to be formed in the Salesian style of life.

The day began with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist presided over by Rt. Rev. Victor Lyngdoh DD, Bishop of Jowai and concelebrated by Fr. Manbha Pakem from the Bishop's House. Soon after Mass, all gathered around the well which is





situated below the hill overlooking the Jowai Shillong Road just like the well in Valponasca where Mother Mazzarello use to fetch water. The design of the well is the replica of the well of Mornese. guided Dakyrmen Sohkhlet meaningful Prayer Service during which Rt. Rev. Victor Lyngdoh blessed the well in the presence of Sr. Rosina Susngi, Animator, the Sisters and girls of the community, some faithful of the Parish and the Chief Guest Shri Andrew Shullai, MDC. A symbolic sign of inauguration was done by the chief Guest in which he turned on the switch and he wished that all who uses the water from the well may enjoy health and prosperity. It is also noteworthy to mention that the MDC had also given some help towards the construction of the well. After the short ceremony, all joined in for breakfast. The well has got a significant story to unfold. It was on 29 March 2016 that the work started but for more than 11 months of work there seemed to produce no result, so the community turned to St. Joseph asking him to give them the gift for his feast and right enough on the vigil of the feast of St. Joseph on 18 March 2017 at 10.30 in the morning a streak of clear water oozed out from one side and

another seeped from the opposite side. Thus the well is a miracle of St. Joseph who never turns down those who place their trust in his intercession.

In the morning hours of 2 February 2018, the students of Class VIII C visited Ferrando Rehabilitation Centre Nandan Nagar. The physically challenged children welcomed them heartily with their own sign language, which they could understand only with the language of love. Pencil Box, eatable items like oranges, apples, grapes, Biscuits, cakes chocolates. They were grateful to their class teacher Ms. Semiwon Khapudang and Sr. Manosha L. She was destined from eternity, To be a zealous Missionary. From far distant Slovenia, She crosses over to India.



Johnny the Lizard


